

BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

Judge Isaac G. and Caroline "Polly" (Clark) Wilson built their Greek Revival house in 1852 (moved to Geneva in 1851 and died in Geneva in 1891). A graduate of Brown University and son of Batavia, Illinois founder, Judge Isaac Wilson, Isaac G. Wilson was an attorney at the time of construction and, at one time, held the distinction of serving "on the bench" longer than any other Illinois judge. The house was sold in 1867 (Wilson built another house in 1878 at 328 S. Second). The house was later owned by the Burton family and a portion moved to 117 S. Second Street.

The original 1852 section may be the current west wing, with the more formal east wing (facing First Street) built in the Greek Revival style before the Civil War. A two-story wing was constructed to the west of the current west wing before 1891 but was removed between 1905 and 1912.

In October 1940, bachelors Matthew C. McNamara (1888-1942) and Roy L. Baum (1903-1973) acquired the property and converted the residence into the McNamara Rest Home, a sanitarium/convalescent home. The Campbell Street facility was also known as the Christian Science Rest Home. The two men previously established a rest home in 1937 at the Howell-Orton-Burton House that stood immediately north of this property. Before coming to Geneva, the two men also established a rest home in Benton Harbor, Michigan in the mid-1930s. Mr. McNamara died in September 1942 at the age of 54 (11 September 1942 Geneva Republican).

In 1946, Roy L. Baum and his contractor, Edward Gabrielson, received a building permit for "additions and alterations to existing sanitarium" (06 December 1946 Geneva Republican). The 1946 wing is the two-story wing constructed at the southeast corner of the building. At that time, a portion of the full-length south porch was removed, and the west end of the south porch was enclosed.

Around 1951 or 1952 (when the brick north wing was constructed), the property became the Anna Baum Nursing Home, named in honor of Roy L. Baum's mother, who was also a resident. After Roy L. Baum's death on July 27, 1973, the facility continued to operate through at least December 1975.

In 1976, John Hamer purchased the property and developed it as professional offices. In 1989, Howard W. and Candace B. Broecker purchased the property.

The property is notable for its association with one or more significant persons and community development—the Early Settlement Period (1837-1857) of Geneva. The property is also notable for its association with architecture—specifically the Greek Revival style—and as an early convalescent facility.
