#### **BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:**

The Herrington Trails land was once part of the circa 1835-1836 claim of brothers James and Crawford Herrington. Following a lawsuit between the brothers, Crawford Herrington sold the pioneer claim to a neighbor in his native Pennsylvania, Franklin Stratton. The land immediately east of the Herrington Trails subdivision was conveyed to Charity Herrington, wife of James Herrington, following the lawsuit. After Franklin Stratton died in 1846, the property was deeded to his widow, Caroline, and eldest son, Charles. Mother and son platted Stratton's Addition to the Original Town of Geneva.

In January 1869, Charles Stratton sold Block 7 of Stratton's Addition to Richard Paver, who—in October 1870—sold a 66-foot-wide strip of his land to the St. Charles Railroad Co. which would become the Seventh Street rail spur line (KCLR Book 113, P 384 and Book 122, P 209). As late as the mid-1890s, only a few portions of Stratton's Addition, primarily fronting South Street, had been sold; the remainder of Stratton's Addition had been vacated.

Residential Development occurred in the mid-1990s and was completed outside the Period of Significance for the Geneva

Historic District and the Central Geneva Historic District, listed in the National Register of Historic Places.
