BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The Joel Niles and Francis (Baker) Wheeler House was built with cement blocks with a stucco finish (04 August 1909 Geneva Republican).

J. Niles Wheeler (1853-1927) served as the owner/editor of the Elgin Daily Leader - established in 1881 - and, later, as the owner/editor of The Patrol newspaper, established in 1884, both in the interest of prohibition. Wheeler hired Forrest Crissey (who became a noted author in his own right) to work for Wheeler's newspaper. In 1888, he formed a stock company for The Patrol, and, later that year, resigned as its manager and editor.

In the 1880s, J. Niles Wheeler mined gravel from the old Danford Farm at the north edge of the city.

In 1896, Wheeler established the Wheeler Screen Co., which produced an adjustable window and door screen in Holland, Michigan. Wheeler brought the company to Geneva the following year. By 1910, the industry was also operating as the Geneva Manufacturing Co. (GEMCO), and by 1912, occupied an entire block along Stevens Street between Fourth and Fifth streets, employing dozens of residents.

In 1909, this home was constructed for the Wheeler family. The exterior walls were constructed of concrete blocks which were parged with stucco. This is an early example of concrete block construction in a residential application.

Francis Wheeler (1854-1939) was "for many years a leader in civic, social and club organizations" at Geneva and served on the first Board of Directors of the Colonial Hospital (established in 1911). Mr. Wheeler acquired the former Danford Quarry property in 1915 and pledged to return it to a natural state, filling the quarry at his own expense over decades.

At the time of J. Niles Wheeler's death, his son, Leon, took over his father's company and operated it until 1962, when the company was sold. In 1950, industrialist and philanthropist Leon Wheeler deeded the reclaimed quarry property to the City of Geneva; the property was renamed Wheeler Park.

Over 60 years, the Fifth Street house passed from J. Niles and Francis Wheeler to their son, Leon, and his wife, Helen, and, then, to their son, Haynes J. Wheeler, who owned the property as late as 1967.

A later, two-car, clapboard-sided garage was constructed after 1945 - possibly the alterations identified in May 1957 (Geneva Republican).

The property is notable for its association with one or more significant persons and architecture—specifically methods of construction.
