OTHER SIGNIFICANT ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES:

Front porch with stone piers and non-fluted columns; fixed window with transom; and decorative shingle-work at gable. Foundation may be limestone that has been parged (may be an early concrete foundation or concrete parging since Charles J. Eckland worked as a cement contractor when he moved to Keokuk, Iowa around 1903).



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ADDITIONAL PROPERTY INFORMATION:

BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The history of this building is unclear. It appears that the building may have been Eliphalet Morron's large barn, built prior to 1885 and depicted on the 1885 Sanborn Fire Insurance Co. map.

The property was purchased by Swedish immigrant Charles J. Eckland in 1903. A building of the same dimensional size is shown on both the 1869 Birds Eye View of Geneva and the 1905 Sanborn Fire Insurance Co. map. The depicted building appears to be a large barn. However, the building is shown as a dwelling in 1905, offset slightly east of the former structure. The 1905 dwelling included the construction of both the front porch and the detached, two-car garage.

Around the turn of the 20th century, other barns in Geneva were converted to residences which makes it feasible that this house may be a converted barn. The wide front facade, front porch with 1/2 columns on raised plinths/pedestals, irregular window placement, eave dropped below window heads, small dormers (with Colonial Revival skirt roof detail), and decorative shingle work at the front gable (typical of the Queen Anne style) all combine to suggest that the building is a remodeled structure.

Alternatively, the structure may be a new dwelling, borrowing from several architectural styles in favor at the time of construction (1900-1905).

Additional research may be required to determine its significance. The property may be notable within a context of Swedish properties in Geneva. If the house is a converted barn, then it may be significant for its association with architecture—specifically methods of construction.
