BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

In late January 1896, Nelson P. Eck, a Swedish immigrant who settled in Geneva, purchased this lot and broke ground for a new two-story residence measuring 24X40 (01 February 1896 Twice-a-Week Republican). The foundation footings were laid by February 18, 1896, and the foundation was completed by March 7, 1896 (Geneva Republican). The house was reported to be "nearly enclosed" by mid-March (21 March 1896 Geneva Republican) and nearly ready for plasterers (08 April 1896 Gen Rep). A front porch was located in the location of the present porch; its roof was first metal (possibly decorative metal shingles) but later replaced with wood shingles. The interior was likely painted and decorated by Eck, who was a highly-regarded painter and decorator in Geneva. Although the corner bay window is not depicted in several Sanborn Fire Insurance maps (1923, 1930, 1945), physical evidence does not suggest that the bay window is a reconstruction and that the fire insurance map omission was a graphic oversight.

A second dwelling stood at the rear (east) portion of the property when owned (1896-1923) by Nelson "Nels" P. Eck and his wife, Anna. Between 1896 and 1923, the Eck property was one of the enclaves of Swedish families that settled in Geneva between 1850 and 1920. The rear house on the Eck property was enlarged and remodeled by the Wilson Brothers in 1909 (compare Sanborn Fire Insurance maps, 1905 and 1912). The rear house was demolished before the construction of the North River Lane Condominiums.

Nels and Anna Eck sold this property to Harold Oscar in July 1923 and moved into their new home at 218 North First Street. Harold Oscar removed the original front porch and divided the home into a two-flat, utilizing the double door entry that survives. The present, brick front porch was built between 1923 and 1930.

The property is notable for its association with one or more significant persons—specifically Nelson P. Eck and Robert Long. The property may also be significant within a context of Swedish properties in Geneva.
