BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The original house on the property was built after Ed Masterson arrived from Ireland in 1854. Ed Masterson is identified as living at this site in 1867. The two-story section of the present house is likely the circa 1870 expansion of an earlier, side-gabled house on the property (illustrated on an 1869 view of Geneva). The house was occupied by Ed and Bridget Masterson; however, Bridget either died or divorced Ed Masterson after 1880.

Mr. Masterson worked for the Chicago and North Western Railroad.

Before 1892, the property was the home of Edward and Delia (Lawler) Masterson. In 1892, Ed and Delia Masterson built a new home (229 S. First Street) to the south of this house (09 April 1892 Geneva Republican).

In 1947, Miss Ada Belle McCleery was living at the address when she was made an Honorary Fellow in the American College of Hospital Administrators. She lived on site as early as 1939.

Hugh and Bess Lockhart purchased the house in 1953 and lived there until as late as 1968.

In 1997, the property was sold by Edward Heymann to Edward and Jean Stealy. In 2008, it was sold to Frederick and Patricia Margulles.

The property is notable for its association with architecture—specifically the Italianate style—community development—specifically the Early Settlement Period (1837-1857) of Geneva—and for its association with the institution of the Chicago and the North Western Railroad line.
