BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

Thomas (Elizabeth [Allan]) Clancy purchased the property from Charity Herrington in 1855.

Mr. Clancy's brother, Patrick, was a stone mason and, likely constructed (or assisted with the construction) of the Clancy House. The two brothers were early settlers of Geneva, arriving around 1853. Patrick may have assisted in the purchase of the First Street property at Geneva. Apparently, Patrick Clancy lived on the south side of State Street, two buildings east of the bridge (approximately 8 East State Street in 2020). In 1873, Patrick died as a result of a tragic bridge-building accident at St. Charles, Illinois.

Thomas Clancy, Sr. was one of the pioneer railroad builders in Geneva. Mr. Clancy and his sons, John and Dan, worked for the Chicago & North Western Railroad. The Clancy family included daughters, Ellen "Nellie" and Elizabeth "Lizzie," and the youngest son, Thomas, Jr. In 1902, Thomas Clancy, Sr. died in Geneva; his wife died in 1888.

Their daughter, Elizabeth (Clancy) Newman, inherited the property and raised four children in the house after her husband deserted the family. Elizabeth died in the family home in February 1936. The last family member to live in the house was Thomas "Bud" Newman, a grandson of the original builder. In April 1977, "Bud" Newman died in the house. The Clancy line occupied the house for 111 years.

The house was renovated in 1989 (including rear additions and a detached, accessory garage) and 1991 (a south addition).

Geneva History Museum Plaque - 1976

The property is notable for its association with one or more significant persons, architecture, methods of construction—specifically locally-quarried limestone construction—and community development—specifically the establishment of the Chicago & North Western Railroad.
