BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The house was built between 1906 and 1909 (see the identical house at 211 N. Second Street) for Peter Pearson (1873-1944), who—as a bachelor—acquired Lots 1, 2, and 3 of Block 17 in 1900. Peter Pearson married Ellen Olsen in 1903; they lived in the house at the northwest corner of First and Ford streets. The family moved to 115 Ford Street in June 1909, when their infant son died. While living in the house, Peter Pearson worked for the Crown Electric Co. of St. Charles, Illinois.

After the death of her husband, August W. Bowgren (1868-1914), the widowed Amanda (Skoglund) Bowgren (1869-1936), and her daughters rented the former Pearson home at the northwest corner of First and Ford streets, beginning in 1915 or 1916.

Like the Pearsons, Mr. and Mrs. Bowgren was born in Sweden.

In 1921, the Pearson's only daughter died. Peter Pearson, his wife, and their only surviving child, Vernon (1905-2003), moved to Chicago in 1922.

Amanda Bowgren acquired the 115 Ford Street property in 1923 and lived there until her death. The house was then passed on to her daughter, Ruth N. Bowgren, who lived in the home until her death in 1990. Members of the Bowgren family lived at the property for 67 years.

In 1991, the house was remodeled (likely some interior improvements) and sold. In 2002, the front porch was reconstructed, an addition erected at the east side, and the interior remodeled. In 2010, the original clapboard siding was replaced with cedar siding.

At the time of its construction, the house was identified as a Colonial Revival design; however, it is defined as a Free Classic Queen Anne design in 2020.

The property is notable within a context of Swedish properties in Geneva and for its association with architecture—specifically the late Queen Anne style.
