## **ADDITIONAL PROPERTY INFORMATION:**

#### BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence was constructed as a barn between 1855 and 1868 (historic accounts differ). A portion of the building is reported to be of log construction or heavy timber framing and may date to 1855-1859, when the property was owned by Eben Conant. In 1859, Conant sold the property to Wesley & Margaret Humphrey, who sold to Edgar Humphrey in 1866. (See 228 N. First Street).

In 1893, the building was converted into a residence by Charles B. Mead, editor of the Geneva Republican newspaper. However, one account states differently (03 March 1893 Patrol).

The property was issued a Geneva History Museum Plaque in 1985.

Although a garage existed as early as 1923, the present, detached garage was built around 1993. In 1946, a permit was issued to John C. Lauer for a garage addition (11 October 1946 Geneva Republican). The 1946 garage may have been the original garage that was dismantled to become a carport.

The property is notable for its association with architecture—specifically methods of construction—and as an example of a surviving, documented barn conversion.
