### **OTHER SIGNIFICANT ARCHITECTURAL FEATURES:**

Second-floor, decorative windows at southwest corner of front facade and west elevation installed as part of the 1898 remodeling, when west addition with projected, bay window was constructed. Bay window has unique, narrow side windows.



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### ADDITIONAL PROPERTY INFORMATION:

#### **BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:**

The house is accredited to John Joseph Chambers, an early carpenter and machinist, who purchased these lots in 1854. "Joseph" Chambers came to Geneva in 1836 with James Brown from New England. Chambers' son, John Chambers, was an early carpenter in the Geneva community.

The house was sold in 1868 to John H. and Ella Green, who resided in Chicago until the Great Fire of 1871. Between 1872 and 1880, the Ford Street entrance was created; the original, five-bay facade at Second Street was likely the original, front facade. The central entrance remains at this elevation, however, the corresponding, second-floor window (visible in the 1869 Bird's Eye View of Geneva) was removed. The porch/veranda was added and, presumably, the former Greek Revival details were removed.

John H. Green served as Justice of the Peace in the 1870s and Mayor (1882-83). John Green died in 1896 and, two years later, it was reported that "Mrs. John Green is remodeling her house and building on an addition of 4 rooms for boarders" (16 March 1898 Geneva Republican).

Albert E. McIntosh acquired the house and owned it until 1941 when it was purchased by Frank Love, the manager of the Geneva Locker Plant, 17 W. State Street.

The property was issued a Geneva History Museum Plaque in 1989.

The property is notable for its association with one or more significant persons—specifically the Chambers family and a Geneva mayor—architecture—specifically the Italianate style—and for community development—specifically the Early Settlement Period of Geneva (1837-1857).
