BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The house was constructed in 1858 for Bethel Perry, who sold the property to Andrew Johnson in 1887.

Upon purchase, Mr. Johnson (1850-1934) erected a two-story addition at the west side of the house, replacing an earlier one-story wing. The addition is marked by an incised porch (now enclosed), a dormer, and a clipped gable.

Born in Sweden in 1850, Mr. Johnson came to Geneva in 1871 and married Matilda Millerburg in 1882. Working into his early seventies, Andrew Johnson was the longest-working employee of the W. H. Howell Mfg. Co., working more than 50 years at the foundry.

In the 1960s, the existing, detached garage was constructed. Between 1972 and 1973, a large one-story addition was added to the rear of the home and the original home was remodeled, including the enclosure of the 1887 front porch.

The property is notable within a context of Swedish properties in Geneva and for its association with community development—specifically the Early Settlement Period of Geneva (1837-1857).
