Pristine example of late nineteenth century, working class housing. Original elements include exposed limestone foundation, clapboard and shingle siding; pedimented porch; wood windows; and single-bay garage with out-swinging doors.



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ADDITIONAL PROPERTY INFORMATION:

BRIEF HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The house was built, most probably, for Peter and Annette Larson in 1892-1893. Larson was a laborer at the nearby Wheeler Screen Company by 1910. He passed away in 1914. Annette Larson was born in Skane, Sweden and arrived in Geneva about 1888. She remained in the house after her husband's death until her own death in 1941. Nellie Larson, their daughter, remained in the house after her mother's passing until her death in 1958. Martin Larson, their son, also remained until his death in 1969. Their other son, Dr. Reinhold F Larson, taught in Urbana.

Quickly after Martin's death in 1969, Lester Bratthauer received a permit for repairs on the house. It appears that at least part of the house was used as a rental property.

The house was one of three houses built on the north side of Ford Street between 1892 and 1894; all three houses (see 515 and 527 Ford Street) bear stylistic similarities. All three properties were owned by Swedish-born laborers who worked in local factories.

With the exception of the altered front window at the first floor (likely a fixed window with a decorative glass transom), the exterior appears much as it did when built nearly 130 years ago.

The property is notable within a context of Swedish properties in Geneva and for its association with architecture—
specifically the Queen Anne style for working-class families.
