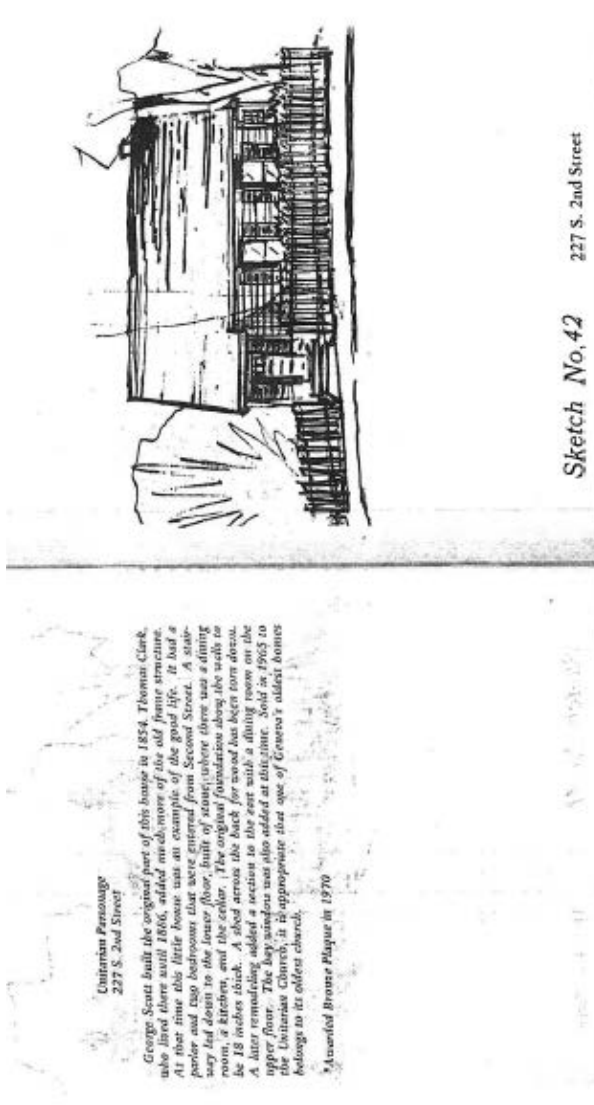

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Unitarian Parsonage
227 S. 2nd Street

George Scott built the original part of this house in 1854. Thomas Clark, who lived there until 1886, added much more of the old frame structure. At that time this little house was an example of the good life. It had a parlor and two bedrooms that were entered from Second Street. A doorway led down to the lower floor, built of stone; where there was a dining room, a kitchen, and the cellar. The original foundation was built of stone, 18 inches thick. A shed across the back for wood had been torn down. A later remodeling added a section to the rear, with a dining room on the upper floor. The bay window was added in 1905. The house was sold in 1965 to the Unitarian Church, it is appropriate that one of Geneva's oldest homes belongs to its oldest church.
